Form your Parish Stewardship Team

Choose People that Care about People

The stewardship team must see their calling as a ministry of love for the Church and her members, seeing all members as branches of the True Vine. John C. Maxwell writes, "People don't care how much you know until they know how much you care." Stewardship is a ministry that requires us to listen to our people, to know them and to love them.

Mailing is Only the Beginning



Mailed communication should be considered only the first step in effective stewardship ministry.

A mail-only stewardship campaign is likely to only maintain current giving levels, and does nothing to engage members in the life of the parish.

But no Sinking Ship Letters




"Our parish's financial condition has weakened over the past three years. Our annual income has decreased, while our operating expenses continue to increase. Additionally, there was a time when our successful festival was a means to reduce debt. It is now a necessity to meet expenses.

As we approach mid-year, the situation has not improved. In fact, our current operating deficit is approximately \$50,000 year-to-date. If we fail to take meaningful corrective steps our deficit will exceed \$100,000 this year.

Clearly, the parish is in financial decline and we must take drastic corrective action."

Clarify Your Parish Mission and Vision







Avoid constant fundraising efforts

*Weekly (so important!):


- ✓ Every Monday write three gratitude notes to someone in your congregation or community




Electronic Giving



KIOSK CONVENIENCE INCREASES STEWARDSHIP

Is a donation kiosk right for your parish? In a recent study of church giving conducted between 2015 and 2017, the traditional methods of donating (cash and check) are declining whereas electronic giving (online, credit/debit card, via bank transfer) is on the rise. The study indicates that the availability of electronic giving extends the opportunity to donate to your church to occasional attendees and those who are absent.

St. Katherine's Greek Orthodox Church in Falls Church, VA decided electronic giving was right for its parish when it placed an encased iPad (pictured below) in the narthex of its church and began taking donations via credit card in April 2017.




Electronic Giving Preferences



Electronic giving has been on the rise across all age groups since 2015. Consider:

- 66-74 years of age: Prefer a debit or credit card for donations
- 55-65 years of age: Prefer electronic transfers from bank accounts
- 45-54 years of age: Prefer making payment via a computer or tablet
- 35-44 years of age: Prefer a debit or credit card for donations
- 25-34 years of age: Prefer to use a smart phone app for donations

The common element to all of the age groups listed above? Their donations in support of your church are made electronically. And 75 percent of Millennials (a coveted age group by all religious denominations) prefer e-giving.



At St. Katherine's, young parishioners were early adopters. The millennial generation does not carry cash (or write checks), opting to pay with a debit or credit card. "In fact, we know that some young people are staying away from church altogether because of this," said Fr. Jim Kordaris, Archdiocesan Director of Stewardship, Outreach and Evangelism.




If you're going to scale the mountains of ministry, you need to leave behind canoes and find new navigational tools.
