# **Annual Parish Survey**

Year two results from a 12-question annual survey initiated by the Metropolis Missions & Evangelism Ministry in January 2020.

Beginning in March 2020, churches worldwide were deeply impacted by the closures and concerns from the COVID-19 pandemic. We knew that 2020 data would show dramatic differences from 2019, as part of telling the story of the pandemic.

As expected, average Sunday attendance was down in 2020, as well as the number of people participating in confession.

More parishes experienced a budget deficit in 2020 than in 2019. Overall income declined, but parishioner giving remained the same. Parish expenses, however, also declined.

Respondents can expect to receive summary reports on the previous year's data at each Clergy-Laity Assembly. All individual parish results will be kept confidential.

Collecting a few key pieces of data gives our Metropolis Missions & Evangelism Ministry **an opportunity to grow in our ability to analyze and interpret data in a meaningful way.** We are in the perfect position to blend qualitative and quantitative research; we can test hypotheses against what we already know about the context of each parish, such as number of clergy serving, year established, location, and even significant moments in the parish history. If over time we see that a certain parish stands out from the data, it gives us a starting point for exploring why this is the case, which in turn may inspire new hypotheses.

All models improve with more data. As our body of data increases over time, our findings will become more meaningful.

The more parishes that participate, the more accurate their responses, and the more data that we gather, the more useful this tool will become for all of our communities.

At the printing of this report, 41 of our 67 parishes, including 3 missions, submitted responses. The breakdown of position in the parish of each respondent is as follows:



Thirty of the parishes submitted surveys both years. Fourteen parishes from 2019 did not respond in 2020, while 11 new parishes came forward for the second survey. **It's not too late.** If your parish has not yet responded, we encourage you to take a

### Live-streaming

127 average Sunday livestream viewers

**38** parishes offering Sunday livestream

Respondents in 2020 were asked to provide the number of livestream viewers to help capture the unique participation of parishioners in 2020. All but the three parishes (three missions) offer Sunday livestream. 20% of respondents did not have a way to measure the number of livestream viewers. There was no correlation between the size of the parish and the number of livestream viewers.

## 2020 Key Observations

## Adults Becoming Orthodox



Although six parishes reported a significant increase, the overall number of adult conversions decreased from 2019 to 2020. Even attributing a decline to the pandemic, the average number of adults received into the church is very low from year to year indicating a need for more systematic evangelism and outreach. Assuming 1 household is 2.6 people the average rate of growth was only 0.09% in 2019 and 2020.

Usually the amount of time between when someone begins attending a parish and when they are received into the Church is more than 12 months. For this reason, it is likely that the 152 people received into the Church in 2020 began attending in 2019 or earlier. We believe it is safe to conclude that whatever winning traits that parishes who had an increase in converts in 2020 have, they are traits they had prior to the pandemic.

We plan to follow-up with those parishes to learn more about how these individuals found the Orthodox Church, and the routine practices of the parish to respond to inquirers.

## Parish Budget Deficit

In 2019, 23.3% of parishes responded that they had a deficit (expenses > income) while in 2020, 42.5% of parishes responded they had a deficit.

A decline in parish income is likely attributable to the cancellation of Greek Festivals and other in-person fundraising events while the decrease in expenses is attributable to an overall decrease in activity in the parish during 2020.

## Year-to-Year Comparison

Significant impacts from the COVID-19 pandemic were observed in several parameters of parish health. Responses from 2019 and 2020 were compared to determine if there were statistically significant differences.

P-value = probability value. The closer the p-value is to 0, the more statistically significant the results are. As the p-value increases, the less likely it is that a difference will be consistent in the data.

In 2019 a model was created to predict the number of Sunday attendees as a function of the number of households in the parish. This model showed that the larger the parish the Sunday engagement dropped sharply.

In 2020 the number of Sunday attendees declined sharply due to restrictions on in-person worship so this model was not evaluated with 2020 data.

The number of persons served locally declined due to restrictions on in-person interactions and should rebound in 2021 as states re-open.

## Confession

The number of persons confessing sharply declined likely due to the unavailability of in-person meetings, as well as restrictions against hearing confessions over the phone or by video conferencing.


## **2019 Key Observations**

## **Metropolis Size**

### 9,900 worshippers

10,300 households Based on 43 responses, the average number of Sunday worshippers is 175, and the median is 150. With these numbers we can estimate that on any given Sunday there are 9,900 worshippers in Liturgy throughout the Metropolis. We can also use this method to estimate that there are 10,300 households affiliated with (i.e. financially supporting) our parishes.

## Predicting Sunday Attendance

At the printing of this report, 43 of our 66 parishes, including 4 missions, submitted responses. The breakdown of position in the parish of each respondent is as follows:

After testing various correlations, the most significant finding was that the larger the parish, the smaller the percentage of people expected in church on Sunday, until it evens off at 22%.

With rare exceptions, parishes that experience ratios above this curve, are those with more than one priest. This information supports a long-held Metropolis ideal that a priest should be assigned to serve

## **Signature Ministries**

Survey respondents shared about many unique ministries that have developed in their communities, especially in the areas of philanthropy and education.
