

BACKGROUND

1. Role of a Teacher

"No books, however good, no programs, however well prepared, will replace the personal influence of the teacher. 2. Role of Mentors

THE FIVE - TO - ONE RATIO FLIP

"Those of us in ministry have gotten used to ratios. We know how many adults need to chaperone a field trip. We know how many young people we can invite to something before we start recruiting more cleared adults. As parents, we know what to ask when our children are invited to parties about the number of adults who might be present.

"Chap Clark, author of great books like *Sticky Faith* turned the ratios around when he first suggested that every child needs five adults investing in their lives. In a 2004 article in *Decision Magazine*, he wrote, "Here's the bottom line: every kid needs five adult fans. Any young person who shows any interest in Christ needs a minimum of five people of various ages who will say, 'I'm going to love that kid until they are fully walking as an adult member of this congregation.'"





VOCATION VOCATION

- Not a specific career
- Whole way of being in the world
- What I am doing with my life is actually secondary to who I am
- But if vocation means "call" there has to be a caller

WHO IS CALLING US?





WHAT DOES HE CALL US *TO*?

Most simply, to sum up all the Law and the Prophets, and as Jesus Himself explains in the Gospels, He calls us to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'" (Matthew 22:37-40)

Our **vocation** is our unique and ongoing response to Christ's call to love God with heart, soul, mind, and strength, and the neighbor as ourself.


THAT'S JUST THE BEGINNING OF THE STORY

- Christ calls us to this, but what does this really mean? How do we love God?
 How do we love our neighbor? For that matter, who is this God, really? And who is my neighbor?
- These are great theological questions. Seeking answers to them helps answer our first question, What is life about? Add to these the question, Who am I? and we have a trilogy of great questions to spark a theological exploration of vocation.







C) TREASURE

- CrossRoad is funded 100% on the generosity of donations from people who love the program
- 40% of our donors are our alumni, ages 18-33
- 19 year olds are giving as much as \$15/month; 32 year olds as much as \$250/month
- 32 year old gave a \$5,000 gift at Christmas
- BUT THEY ARE NOT JUST GIVING TO CROSSROAD
 - Priests have told me they are surprisingly generous contributors to their parishes
 - And they're not just fundraising for CR they are raising funds for all sorts of ministries in the Church
- It is humbling and we know it's not just us it's great parishes, clergy, and families who are raising these kids and we get to be a part of the amazing journey

3. Share vision, real costs, & right-sized goals






4TH REFLECTION
